#### **BRIEF COURSE DESCRIPTION**

Apart from mastering the English language, tourism professionals should now be able to address their clients and collaborators in their own language as correctly as possible. The aim of this course is to enhance the students' communication skills in German, French, Italian, Chinese or Spanish so as to become effective language users, especially in the most common oral and written professional situations in the tourism sector. An innovative approach will be adopted which promotes sustainability, digitalization and communication at different levels depending on the chosen language of study.
